- Heard a report from the Directors Association representative Rosemary Cooper on the Fine Free Program that has begun in several member libraries.
- Appointed Carla Randazzo Amthor of Wallkill, NY to fill the Ulster County seat on the RCLS Board until elections at the next Annual Meeting.
- Recognized that all but \$250 was raised for the cost of the 2018 RCLS Legislative Breakfast and Annual Meeting.
- Witnessed the drawing of the seven winners' names of the Biblio Baskets raffle. The proceeds of over \$1,500 from this fundraiser activity will benefit the RCLS Delivery Van Fund.
- Save the date, **Wednesday**, **February 27**, **2019** for the New York Library Association Library Advocacy Day.
- Save the date, **September 13, 2019** for the RCLS Legislative Breakfast and Annual meeting.

## 2018 National Book Awards

USA Today, Nov. 14

Sigrid Nunez won the 2018 National Book Award for fiction for *The Friend* (Riverhead) at a November 14 ceremony in

New York City. The 69th annual National Book Awards were sponsored by the National Book Foundation. Diversity was once again in the spotlight throughout the evening. The young people's literature award went to slam poet Elizabeth Acevedo for The Poet X (HarperTeen), featuring an Afro-Latina heroine. The nonfiction winner was Jeffrey C. Stewart for The New Negro: The Life of Alain Locke (Oxford), and Justin Phillip Reed won the poetry prize for Indecency (Coffee House Press).
