## Census Resources for Libraries

AL: The Scoop, Jan. 15

Gavin Baker and Larra Clark write, "The 2020 Census begins April 1, 2020, and libraries will play an essential role in helping their communities be counted. Now is a good time for libraries to begin thinking about what activities they might undertake to meet these special, once-a-decade demands, and how to access resources to fulfill those needs. Libraries can look for funding opportunities from government, philanthropy, and business partners. A good way to find out about opportunities is by participating in a Complete Count Committee."

#### Ezra Jack Keats Foundation Mini-Grants

Established by children's book author and illustrator Ezra Jack Keats, the Ezra Jack Keats Foundation is accepting applications for its mini-grants program, which supports projects that foster creative expression, collaboration, and interaction with a diverse community.

Through the program, mini-grants of up to \$500 will be awarded to educators in support of special activities and events outside the standard curriculum. Projects funded in the past have included murals, pen pal groups, quilts, theater productions, student newspapers and other publications, intergenerational activities, and programs that bring disparate communities together.

Complete program guidelines, a video tutorial for applicants, and the application form are available at the Ezra Jack Keats Foundation website. Deadline to submit an application is **Sunday, March 31**.

#### 2019 Library of Congress Award

The Library of Congress invites organizations committed to the advancement of literacy to apply for the 2019 Library of Congress Literacy Awards. Created and supported by philanthropist David M. Rubenstein, the Literacy Awards Program is designed to broaden and stimulate public understanding of the essential role of literacy in all aspects of society.

Organizations may submit applications for one of three major prizes: the David M. Rubenstein Prize (\$150,000), the American Prize (\$50,000) and the International Prize (\$50,000). Applications in all categories will also be considered for Best Practice awards of \$5,000 each.

The application, rules and other information are available on the <u>Library of Congress website</u>. The deadline for applications is midnight **Friday, March 8**.

#### YSS Spring Conference

This year the YSS Spring Conference is on **Friday**, **April 26** in nearby Tarrytown at the Double Tree by Hilton.

Two annual Spring Conference Scholarships are offered to encourage continuing education in the field of library youth services by participating in the annual YSS Spring Conference. The first is the *New Member Spring Conference Scholarship*, given to a new member of the profession. The second is the *Lisa C. Wemett Spring Conference Scholarship*, given to a highly motivated established librarian who has had a significant impact on youth and youth services in her/his community. Each of the scholarships is designed to cover registration fees and up to \$250 reimbursement for hotel charges, meals, and transportation costs for attending the conference. Applications are due **Friday, February 1.**


