NEA Art Works Grants

These National Endowment for the Arts grants support artistically excellent projects that celebrate creativity and cultural heritage, invite mutual respect for differing beliefs and values, and enrich humanity. Projects may be large or small, existing or new, and may take place in any part of the nation's 50 states, the District of Columbia, and U.S. territories. Matching grants generally range from \$10,000 to \$100,000. A minimum cost share/match equal to the grant amount is required. Applicants can be nonprofit, tax-exempt 501(c)(3), U.S. organizations; units of state or local government; or federally recognized tribal communities or tribes. Applications for artistically excellent projects that address any of the following activities below are encouraged:

- Honor the 2020 centennial of women's voting rights in the United States (aka the Women's Suffrage Centennial).
- Engage with Historically Black Colleges and Universities (HBCUs); Hispanic or Latino organizations; or the Native American, Alaskan Native, and Native Hawaiian arts.
- Celebrate America's creativity and cultural heritage.
- Invite a dialogue that fosters a mutual respect for the diverse beliefs and values of all persons and groups.
- Enrich our humanity by broadening our understanding of ourselves as individuals and as a society.

Help NASA Measure Trees

Healthy forests play a crucial role in Earth's ecosystem as growing trees take up carbon from the atmosphere. NASA

satellites and airborne missions study forests to see how carbon moves through ecosystems—and now citizen scientists can help investigate this key question as well by using their smartphones to measure tree height. The GLOBE Observer app provides a



step-by-step guide for people to collect scientific data on their surroundings. With its new GLOBE Trees feature, observers can record tree height by tilting their phone up and down to align the screen with the tree's top branch and base, and pace off the distance to the tree; the app does the rest.

On **Saturday, May 4,** the story garden that sits beside the **Ethelbert B. Crawford Public Library** in Monticello will receive an honor. At that time, United for Libraries, a division of the American Library Association, will designate the garden known as "Vera's Story Garden" a Literary Landmark. The library named the garden after children's book author and illustrator <u>Vera B. Williams</u>. Williams lived in Sullivan County along the Delaware River in Narrowsburg, NY for the last 15 years of her life (1927-2015).

When plans for the new library were underway, a desire was to have a "big, fat, comfortable, wonderful chair" – like the one in Ms. Williams' Caldecott Honor book A Chair for My Mother – in the new children's room for people to cozy together in and read. However, not enough room was found for a chair of such grandeur. Instead, one was built – outside – in what became Vera's Story Garden.

The picture book that inspired the chair in the Story Garden tells of a family – a girl named Rosa, her mother and her grandmother – who struggle to make ends meet. Yet, they are able to rise above their hardships to live a happy and loving life together. The Story Garden designated as a Literary Landmark will serve as a lasting legacy to Vera B. Williams, her stories and illustrations, and to the inspiration she gave to the children for whom she wrote.

All are welcome to attend the unveiling of the Literary Landmark plaque on **Saturday, May 4** at 11 a.m.; stay for refreshments and StoryWalk a *Chair for My Mother* along Broadway. Call the library for details at 845.794.4660 ext.7.

Digital access to the 2020 Census at New York's public libraries will be a major factor in achieving a fair and accurate count in New York State. To build capacity and technical support at libraries, and to ensure that libraries are able to preserve patron privacy during the digital census, the Digital Equity Laboratory at the New School has made tools available to help libraries implement best digital security practices for the 2020 Census.
