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Libraries Encouraged to Apply for 'Bullet Aid'

As you are likely aware, recent NYS budgets have included appropriations for direct grants-in-aid to certain educational

and library systems. The recently adopted state budget again has included these funds – 'Bullet Aid,' in the vernacular. NYLA has effectively partnered with library and library system directors to grow the share of Bullet Aid awards to libraries. We owe this success

institutions, including libraries



in part to the increased number of libraries submitting requests for funding. This year, these pots of aid are much smaller than the tens of millions available to each house in prior years – \$5M is available to each the Senate and Assembly. The diminished amount of available aid will likely affect how it is appropriated from each house's pot; in the past, program aid was awarded at the discretion of individual legislators from their share of available funds.

Despite these changed circumstances, we strongly encourage all public libraries to submit a funding request funding to their State Senator and State Assemblymember, regardless of whether that member is in their house's majority. Project awards have ranged from as little as \$500 to over \$50K, to support a range of projects including programming, technology upgrades, and renewable energy and sustainability initiatives.

NYLA is pleased to provide a baseline template for submitting a request for funding.

The 2018 RCLS Statistics are available on the <u>RCLS</u> website both as an <u>Excel file</u> and <u>a PDF</u>.



Other free items are available to those who come to RCLS to preview the books.



LC Puts Classic Children's Books Online

Library of Congress, Apr. 29 celebration of the anniversary of Children's Book Week (April 29–May 5), the Library of Congress on April 29 launched an online collection of 67 historically significant children's books published more than 100 years ago. Drawn from the LC collection, Children's Book Selections are digital versions both of classic works still read by children today and of lesser-known treasures. From Humpty Dumpty to Little Red Riding Hood, the books in this collection were published in the US and England before 1924, are no longer under copyright, and are free to share.



Workshop

Many of the online applications we have come to know and love trade their free services for access to your personal data. And whether we know it or not, the data we create has become an extremely valuable commodity.

This workshop will provide a gentle introduction to how the internet works so that we can identify how and why our information can be collected, both with and without our knowledge.

We will take a tour of the online information flow, discuss the ways in which our information is used, and describe how even our smallest actions – like which posts we stop to read and which links we click – amount to data so valuable that internet companies will do almost anything to keep your attention.

We will explore the ways in which internet companies make their products compelling and provide steps to take to reduce your contributions (should you choose) to companies that grow rich based on your time and attention.

By the end of this workshop, you will have a better sense of the data that is being collected about you, why it is being collected, and what we can do to protect ourselves from this relentless surveillance.

Presenter

As Program Manager for Technology, Culture, and Libraries, Davis's work focuses on understanding the impact of technology on culture at large, translating these challenges into real solutions for library staff. She is project lead for NYC Digital Safety, an NYC-funded program that keeps library staff informed about evergreen topics in data privacy and digital security.

Davis worked with Mozilla Foundation to review and update their web literacy curriculum, resulting in the launch of Mozilla's Core Curriculum for Web Literacy in March 2018. In addition to planning and emceeing METRO's symposia series, Davis has designed and facilitated workshops on data privacy and security, web mechanics, and personal networking skills for library staff.
