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ALA Offers 2020 Census Mini-Grants

The <u>American Library Association</u> (ALA) is now accepting <u>online applications</u> for <u>Library Census Equity Fund</u> minigrants.

ALA will provide 25 libraries with \$2,000 mini-grants to bolster their service to hard-to-count communities and help achieve a complete count in the 2020 Census.

Applicants may propose activities



such as conducting community outreach activities or expanding the library's technology capacity for people completing the census questionnaire online. All types of libraries and library organizations are eligible to apply (e.g., public libraries, school libraries, academic libraries, tribal libraries, state library agencies, Library Friends or Foundations, library cooperatives, state library associations, etc.).

Applications are due Friday, November 22.

Southeastern New York Library Resources Council (SENYLRC) is pleased to announce that its members' <u>digital</u>

<u>collections</u> are now discoverable through <u>New</u> <u>York Heritage</u>. Cross search its region's collections with collections from across the state



and learn more about the rich history of the Hudson River Valley. New York Heritage is a collaborative project of the Empire State Library Network, of which Southeastern is a member.

Hundreds of cultural organizations have contributed collections to New York Heritage resulting in over a quarter of a million historical resources. Those resources are as diverse as the organizations that participate. Visitors can learn about a countless number of topics and explore a wide variety of original formats.

To find resources, you can keyword search across all of the digital resources from the home page. You can also explore via <u>contributing organization</u> or <u>digital collection</u>. Once in the digital collections, there are options for filtering a set of results by subject, format, or location.

The Hour of Code during Computer Science Education Week – **December 9** -**15** – is a one-hour introduction to computer science that promotes diversity in tech fields, builds job skills and provides an opportunity for young people to learn about tools that increasingly shape our lives. Hour of



Code activities include tutorials for all types of devices and even unplugged exercises, all of which are self-guided, so

hosting an event does not require coding experience. We live in a world surrounded by technology, and we know that whatever field someone chooses to go into, his/her ability to succeed will increasingly depend on understanding how technology works, but only a tiny fraction of people are how technology learning works. Inspired by the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals, this year, the Hour of Code will highlight how we can all use computer science to make a positive impact on our world, from writing apps to solving a local problem, to using innovative ideas in data science to address global challenges. This grant awards \$1,000 for collection development to YALSA members who represent a public library and who work directly with young adults ages 12 to 18. Up to two grants will be awarded annually.

IMLS Small Library Grants

For a second year, the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) is accepting grant applications for Accelerating Promising Practices (APP) for Small Libraries. The deadline to apply is **Monday**, **December 2.** APP is a special initiative of National Leadership Grants for Libraries, a program that supports library and archives services nationwide by advancing theory and practice to strengthen the ability of small and/or rural libraries, archives, and related organizations to serve their communities. KidsGardening's Youth Garden Grants

The <u>Youth Garden Grant</u> is open to any nonprofit organization, public or private school, or youth program in the US planning a new garden program or expanding an established one that serves at least 15 youth, between the ages of 3 and 18. The selection of winners is based on demonstrated program impact and sustainability.

A total of 25 programs will be awarded. The top five programs will receive award packages valued at \$2,360 that include: \$250 cash prize, a variety of gardening tools and supplies, including: \$1,000 customizable garden tool package from Corona, Pallet of Black Gold soil by SunGro Horticulture, 25' Soaker Hose from Dramm, One Touch Fan Nozzle from Dramm, KidsGardening.org curriculum package, Seed Package from High Mowing Organic Seeds, and more.

Twenty programs will receive award packages valued at \$775 that include: \$250 cash prize from KidsGardening, A variety of gardening tools and supplies, and KidsGardening.org curriculum package.

2019 Summer Reading Program Participation

More than 2.5 million students and children statewide participated in the 2019 summer reading program, an increase of approximately 134,000 participants over last year's program, the New York State Education Department and State Library announced. In addition, the State Education Department announced results from its partnership with the myON bv Renaissance e-book platform, which offered free access to thousands of enhanced digital books to children and their families. From May through September 2019: 118,569 books were opened/browsed, 114,128 books were read, and 1,635,585 minutes of reading were logged within the myON platform.
